NOT-FOR-PROFIT

Profits are returned to members in the form of lower loan rates, higher savings rates and fewer fees.

Mobile* and online banking options and access to service representatives.

OWNERSHIP

Owned by members.

MEMBERSHIP

Must apply. Products and services tailored to a specific membership.

RATES

Loan rates often lower, savings rates often higher.





















FIRST, WHAT IS CREDIT?

Credit helps you borrow money and make purchases, like your first car or an apartment rental. Your credit score, a 3-digit number usually ranging from 300 to 850, represents your credit habits. Generally, the better your history of repaying debt, the higher your credit score.



WHY DO I NEED CREDIT?

When you apply for a car loan or any other type of loan, lenders review your credit score and repayment history. Based on your credit score, they decide whether or not you're likely to pay back the money. And, your score typically gets used to determine your interest rate. Higher credit score, lower interest rate—which ultimately saves you more money in the long run.

HOW DO I CHECK MY CREDIT?

Your credit report gives you important information about your financial standing—including a credit summary, account history, who's requested your credit score and any delinquencies (if there are any). Everyone has access to their credit report. It's a good idea to check it at least once a year to keep track of your activity and correct any mistakes you notice. While your credit report won't include your credit score (unless you opt to pay for it), it will give you a good snapshot of where you stand. Plus, checking your own credit report won't affect your score. You can also check with your credit card issuer or lender because many, like Navy Federal, offer free credit scores through your account.
